COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

OLD TESTAMENT

OTBB7947 Job

The course is an in-depth survey of the book of Job that brings Job into today's pulpit with practical application and theological insights. *Dr. Harley Howard*

OTBB8947 Song of Solomon

This course is a unique course that examines the book from four different perspectives: 1) historical – Solomon and his wife; 2) practical – man & wife principles; 3) Theological – God and the nation of Israel's relationship; and 4) Christological – Christ and the Church's relationship. *Dr. John Klink*

OTBB7855 Isaiah I

This course begins with a critical introduction to the book of Isaiah. Included is a scholarly apologetic defense against Deutero- & Trito Isaiah, and the use of the phrase "young woman" as used in the RSV in Isaiah 7:14. Chapters 1-39 ("Judgment Section") are covered in the course. Great attention is given to the Jews' rejection of the Messiah, the resulting punishments, the remnant, and the glories of the Millennial Kingdom. Attention also is given to the "Little Apocalypse" (Chapters 24-27) and the 'ten blessings' (Chapter 30). The course gives attention to Biblical types and their anti-types. *Dr. John Nocera*

OTBB7856 Isaiah II

The course covers Chapters 40-66 of Isaiah (the "Redemption Section"). The class will examine the role of the perfect Redeemer and prove that only Christ could meet the requirements. Covered in detail are the prophecies relating to restored Israel. *Dr. John Nocera*

OTBB8865 Daniel

The course begins with an in-depth introduction to Daniel and its place in the OT canon. Particular detail is given to the two languages of the book, the purpose of the book, the dating of the book, and Daniel's educational background. Each of the chapters is dealt with in detail. *Dr. John Nocera*

OTBB8877 Zechariah

The course begins with an in-depth introduction to Zechariah, including the historical setting, the author, and the themes of the book. Heavy emphasis is given to each of the prophet's visions, and the lectures include detailed explanation of symbolism used within each. Lectures cover the books relevance to the future Tribulation and Millennium, with special emphasis placed upon Jerusalem's relationship to these events. *Dr. Gino Cascieri*

NEW TESTAMENT

NTBB8101 Matthew I

The course examines the first 13 chapters of Matthew in a verse-by-verse style. Special attention is given to the authorship, date, audience, and theme of the gospel. The Roman Catholic teaching concerning Mary is refuted, and the virgin birth is examined. Emphasis is given to the Jewish character of the book, with lectures highlighting the Christ as King. *Dr. John Nocera*

NTBB8102 Matthew II

This course examines the remaining chapters of Matthew giving close examination to the parables, prophetic sections, the Olivet Discourse, the crucifixion, and the events that led to the crucifixion. *Dr. John Nocera*

NTBB6212 Acts I

The course covers the first 10 chapters of the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the birth of the church, the

day of Pentecost, the role of the church, and the founders of the church. The gift of tongues is examined from a Scriptural perspective. Focus is also given to Peter as the primary figure of the early chapters of the book.

Dr. Harley Howard

NTBB6213 Acts II

The course covers the remaining chapters of the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the ministry of Paul, the primary figure of the latter chapters of the book. Focus is upon the missionary journeys of Paul and upon his writings and teachings. The early days of the church are examined most carefully. *Dr. Harley Howard*

NTBB6515 Romans

The course is an exposition of Paul's most well read epistle. Dr. Hayes brings a dynamic preaching-teaching style that emphasizes both the doctrinal and practical aspects of the book, making Romans fully applicable to all of today's saints. The student will find this course to be most helpful and informative for defending the Christian faith. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

NTBB8525 Galatians

This course is a verse by verse exposition of Galatians. The theological implications are balanced with practical application. The course instructs the student in the relationship of law and grace. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

NTBB6527 Ephesians

The course is a verse-by-verse exposition of Ephesians. The course closely studies the compatibility of Reformed Theology with Paul's letter, holding to a view that Calvinism is at odds with Scripture. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

NTBB6429 Philippians/Colossians

The course is a verse-by-verse study of Philippians and Colossians, with special attention given to the contents and doctrinal implications of the books. The course gives the student a basic foundation for understanding Pauline theology. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

NTBB8538 I & II Thessalonians

The course is a verse-by-verse exposition of Thessalonians which emphasizes the doctrinal implications of the epistle, while making practical applications from the book. Special emphasis is given to election, foreknowledge, a defense of pre-tribulational rapture and the practical application of administrating the church. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

NTBB8869 I John – Jude

The course is a verse-by-verse exposition of the four general epistles preceding Revelation. The course focuses upon the continuity of the message of the books and is one of ATS students' favorite courses. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

THEOLOGY

THEO5000 Systematic Theology

The course is a survey of the major and critical Christian doctrines from both the Old and New Testaments. The course covers the doctrines one by one topically. Systematic Theology is a necessity for a defense of the Christian faith and for understanding the Bible's message in totality. *Dr. James Gibson*

THEO8100 OT Theology

The course is an examination of the major theological themes presented by each OT author, presenting a theological outline and a time line application. *Dr. William Seay*

THEO6200 NT Theology

The course is an examination of the major theological themes presented by each New Testament author, presenting a theological outline and time line application. *Dr. William Seay*

THEO7310 Doctrine of God

The course analyzes the existence, nature, attributes, names, fatherhood, and silence of God. The analysis is drawn from a wealth of Old and New Testament passages, giving the student a firm Biblical understanding of God's revelation to man of Himself. *Dr. Gino Cascieri*

THEO7330 Doctrine of the Holy Spirit

The course is an in-depth examination of the person and work of the Holy Spirit. The course begins with a defense of the person of the Holy Spirit, emphasizing His actions and personality. The course then moves to a defense of His deity. This is followed by a study of the names and emblems of the Holy Spirit. *Dr. Gino Cascieri*

THEO7340 Doctrine of Christ

The course focuses on both Christ's humanity and deity, studying the important events and character of Jesus. *Dr. Gino Cascieri*

THEO6370 Doctrine of Salvation

The course is an in-depth examination of the doctrine of salvation. The course highlights the definition and importance of regeneration, adoption, justification, imputation, sanctification, reconciliation, propitiation, and redemption. The course is a defense of salvation by grace through faith. *Dr. Gino Cascieri*

THEO6700 Practical Theology

The course is an examination of the pastor of the church and emphasizes the his call, aim, purpose, resources, commission, message, walk, reward, and other areas relevant to the pastor's personal life and suffering. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, President of ATS*

THEO6400 Pastoral Theology

The course examines the many aspects of the ministry, the nature of the church, spiritual leadership, sermon preparation, facing discouragement, and church discipline. *Dr. William Seay*

CHRISTIAN & PASTORAL COUNSELING

PCPM6000 Pastoral Counseling

This course is designed to give the pastor or church staff counselor a short term model that will be workable within a church setting. It sets limits on time, number of sessions, and types of counseling. It is a practical, helpful course. *Dr. Ed Fleming*

PCPM6075 Bereavement Counseling

This course defines the meaning of comfort and how to share comfort. It explores the purpose of funerals, and provides insight into handling special situations such as suicide, murder, multiple deaths, divided families, and others. This practical course will be invaluable to those dealing with families during their time of grief. *Dr. Jimmy L. Hayes, Th.D., President of ATS*

CPPM7200 Counseling the Depressed

This course defines and contrasts clinical depression as opposed to normal depression. The course discusses the prevalence of depression in our modern society, outlining the symptoms of depression. The course then presents the five-stage process for counseling with the depressed. *Dr. C.M. Hayes*

CPPM8275 Addictive Behavior

This course presents a Biblical view of addictions. The course reviews the types of addictive drugs, and gives insight into how to confront the addict in a loving manner. Emphasis is given to examining the truths of God vs. the lies of Satan, and the course outlines a five session plan for counseling the person who suffers from addictive behavior. *Dr. C.M. Hayes*

CPPM7150 Marriage Conflicts

This course is designed to help promote a healing relationship in marriages that suffer from conflict. The instructor

presents a comparison of contractual commitment and covenant commitment. The course promotes confession, forgiveness, closeness, and effective communication within the marriage. *Dr. C.M. Hayes*

CPPM6100 Pre-Marital Counseling

The course presents a step-by-step plan for pre-marital counseling. Issues such as data gathering, policy explanation, salvation and religious issues, decision-making, and the marital covenant are discussed. The foundation of the course is Biblical principles. It also examines communication skills, finances, marriage killers, and children.

Dr. Daniel Moore

CPBK8025 Grief & Trauma

The course examines a Biblical view of why people experience grief and trauma and explores coming to terms with both. Students must purchase book *Overcoming Grief & Trauma* by Mel Lawrenz & Daniel Green. Available at Rayann's Bookstore only (1-800-736-7681) since it is reprinted especially for the seminary.

PCBK6000 Biblical Counseling

This course instructs the student in developing skills for Biblical counseling and gives models for counseling by lay Christians, congregational leaders, and trained therapists. Students must purchase book *Biblical Counseling for Today* by Jeffrey Watson.

PCBK6000 Crisis Counseling

This course is a book course which defines a crisis, gives the phases of a crisis, instructs on crisis intervention, and gives special emphasis on working with children and adolescents during a time of crisis. In our modern society, this is a must have course. Students must purchase book *The New Guide to Crisis and Trauma Counseling* by H. Norman Wright.

PCPM6300 Ministering to the Chronically & Terminally Ill

This course is taught by a man who has worked many years with hospice patients. His insight into dealing with victims of chronic and terminal illnesses is most helpful to those dealing with the sick and shut-in. *Dr. Larry Hendrickson*

NCCA7500 Creation Therapy

Creation Therapy is a counseling method based on the belief that man is a uniquely created being rather than the result of an evolutionary process. It introduces a counseling method that targets the source rather than the problem. The course includes a video tape, textbook, workbook and Code of Ethics. *Dr. Richard Arno NCCA/SACC Course*

NCCA7000 Basic Christian Counseling

The course provides the student with an overview of the "Big Eight" counseling/therapeutic methods. In addition, the student will be taught the difference between secular and Christian counseling, goals, techniques, and the dangers and pitfalls of counseling. *Dr. Richard Arno NCCA Course*

NCCA7050 Christian Psychology & Counseling

The course provides general information regarding the basic theories concerning historical systems of psychology, counseling, Biblical theories of counseling, and the utilization of the NCCA counseling model. *Dr. Richard & Dr. Phyllis Arno NCCA Course & Dr. Terry & Dr. Debra King*

NCCA7060 Mastering Pastoral Counseling

The student will be provided with specific information regarding stress, anger, and guilt with the emphasis on the need to develop family relationships. *Dr. Richard & Dr. Phyllis Arno NCCA Course*

NCCA 7075 Temperament Case Studies

The course will familiarize the student with case studies that have utilized the counseling model taught by NCCA. The student will learn to write his or her own case studies. *Dr. Phyllis Arno NCCA Course*

NCCA7080 Quality, Ethics, and Legal Issues

This course provides information regarding ethical issues, the importance of confidentiality, referrals, and helpful

agencies and programs. The course provides many helpful forms to be used by the counselor in the future. *Dr. Mildred Burckley NCCA Course*

NCCA7090 Codependency

This course will provide the student with specialized training regarding codependency which incorporates the counseling taught by NCCA. *Dr. Jean M. LaCour NCCA Course*

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

CEBK5000 Christian Education I

This course is a book course that covers organizing educational programs, training volunteers, teaching new Christians, and many other practical aspects of the ministry. Student must purchase a textbook: *Christian Education Handbook* by Bruce Powers

CEBK5010 Christian Education II

This course is a book course that defines Christian Education, reviews its history, and looks at its future. Information is given on the teaching-learning process with pertinent information for groups of people such as infants, children, teens, adults, and even exceptional persons. Insight is also given on the church's strategies for Christian education. Student must purchase a textbook: *Christian Education: Foundations for the Future* By Robert Clark, Lin Johnson, and Allyn Sloat

CEBK5015 Youth Ministry

This course is a book course that helps the youth worker put the focus on Jesus. It guides the leader to listen more intently to God and respond more directly to the needs of the students. Student must purchase a textbook: *Contemplative Youth Ministry* by Mark Yaconelli.

CEBK5020 Methods of Teaching

This course is a book course that gives information on how to instruct with power and passion in order to make a permanent impact on others by practicing 7 principles on education, communication, etc. Student must purchase book: *Teaching to Change Lives* by Howard G. Hendricks.

CEBK6000 Christian Ed in Small Churches

This course is a book course that offers field tested plans to guide the pastor to quality Christian education on limited resources. Info is given on designing curriculum, equipping leaders, building relationships for worship, and much more. Student must purchase book: *Christian Education in Small Churches* by Douglas Walrath.

CEBK6010 Christian Education for the Real World

This course is a book course that covers a brief history of Christian education and gives a framework for educators in home schools, Christian schools, and public schools. Student must purchase book: *Christian Education for the Real World* by Henry M. Morris

CEBK6015 Christian School Management

This course is a book course that presents a practical model for a Christian school, whether it is just beginning or seeking continued improvement. Student must purchase book: *Management Principles for Christian School* by James Deuink

CEBK6020 Ministering to Today's Adults

This is a book course that gives an analysis of what it takes to capture the attention of adults, minister to their needs, and solve common problems. Student must purchase book: *Ministering to Today's Adults* by Kenn Gangel.

CHURCH ADMINISTRATION

CABK5000 Church Administration I

This is a book course that helps familiarize the modern pastor in areas beyond preaching such as budgets, fire safety, and church management. The required book will serve as a reference for years to come. Students must purchase book: *Church Administration and Finance Manual* by O.F. Crumroy, Jr.; S.J. Kukawa; and F.M. Wittman

CABK5010 Leading Small Groups

This is a book course designed to acquaint the student with philosophy and structure of small groups, discipleship, conducting meetings, and other information vital to leading successful small groups. Student must purchase book: *Leading Life-Changing Small Groups* by Bill Donahue.

CABK5010 Christian Leadership

This is a book course that gives insight on helping others excel in any area – at the gym, the workplace, home, or church. Become an effective Christian coach that models Jesus as servant and leader. Student must purchase book: *Christian Coaching: Helping Others Turn Potential into Reality* by Gary Collins.

CABK5015 Building God's Church

This is a book course that examines 10 time tested church grow principles. Student must purchase book: *When God Builds A Church* by Bob Russell.

CABK5020 Church Administration II

This is a book course that covers personal management, ministry transitions, enabling leadership, staff supervision and management, and financial matters. Student must purchase book: *Leadership Handbook of Management and Administration* by James Berkley.

RESEARCH

THDS9000 Dissertation 6 hrs

The dissertation must demonstrate a valid and meaningful thesis statement, thorough research, adequate use of Scripture references, and adequate writing skills. The seminary requires the thesis to be at least 20,000 words to 30,000 words (approximately 80 to 100 pages). Additional information will be sent out to students enrolled in programs requiring a dissertation.

THRS6999 Theological Research

Each theological research course requires extensive research of the Scripture and other sources applicable to the major by the graduate or doctorate student.

ADDITIONAL COURSES OFFERED BY ATS

The following section of the ATS Catalog gives information on the Institute of Theological Studies (ITS courses). These courses are used by various seminaries all over the United States and are highly recognized. ATS has a working relationship with ITS, and we are able to offer these courses to any students who choose to take them. The cost for each course is \$300.00. Students may choose one or more. If taken in conjunction with an Andersonville Theological Seminary program, additional fees will be added to cover the courses. A counselor will be happy to explain any additional fees and change of payment plans.

Understand, students are not required to take any of these courses. As a matter of fact, of the 6,000 plus students we have enrolled, the vast majority chooses the Andersonville Theological Seminary course tracks. Feedback tells us that our students prefer the ATS courses. However, you may see a course that you would like to take. Please feel free to do so.

Important note: It is imperative that the prospective student realizes that Andersonville Theological Seminary does not necessarily endorse the doctrines that are taught in any given ITS course. These courses are offered to expose students to a variety of teachings regarding a given topic so that the student may more fully understand the controversies and issues involved with that topic. We, however, do endorse wholeheartedly Andersonville Theological Seminary courses, as they have proven to equip the pastor and Christian worker for over 25 years.

ITOT6001 The Pentateuch

A study of the Pentateuch with consideration of the particular Pentateuch problems of evolution and higher criticism. The laws, which form the basis of Israel's theocracy, are examined with regard to their content, meaning, and applicability today. *R. Laird Harris, Ph.D.*

ITOT6002 Conquest & Settlement

A study of the conquest and settlement period of Israel's history. The books covered are Joshua, Judges, and Ruth. Special consideration is given to late Bronze Age materials from Palestine, which provides the cultural background for this era. *John J. Davis, Th.D.*

ITOT6003 The United Monarchy

A historical, archaeological, and theological analysis of the United Monarchy in Israel. The books covered are I & II Samuel, the first ten chapters of I Kings, and the parallel passages in Chronicles and Psalms. *John J. Davis, Th.D.*

ITOT6004 The Divided Monarchy

The history of Israel is traced from Solomon's apostasy (I Kings 11) to the Babylonian Captivity (II Kings 25). Special emphasis is given to the miracle ministries of Elijah and Elisha. Passages from Chronicles and the prophetic books are interwoven, as well as evidence from contemporary secular history. *John C. Whitcomb, Th.D.*

ITOT6008 Post-Exilic Prophets

A survey of the historical and Biblical contexts of the prophets Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi with an exposition of each of these books. *Richard O. Rigsby, Ph.D.*

ITNT4016 Book of Revelation

This course looks at the possible interpretations of the end times using sound Biblical exegesis with historical and contextual facts. Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to 1) grasp the message of Revelation, 2) articulate possible interpretations of the book, 3) recognize God has a plan for history, and 5) apply the book's message to life and ministry. *Dr. Wilbur Smith*

ITST6006 Doctrine of the Trinity

The doctrine of the Trinity is presented from Biblical, historical, dogmatic, and contemporary perspectives. Special attention is paid to the historical formulation and recent attempts at reformulation of the doctrine. Further, the commitment of the church to the Trinity is explained and commended. *Peter Toon, Ph.D.*

ITST6003 Contemporary Theology I

This course begins with a review of the major developments in Western thoughts prior to Hegel. Course discussion highlights the thought of Hegel, Kierkegaard, Barth, Bultmann, Tillich, and the "God is Dead" theologies. Emphasis is also given to the philosophy of the earlier and later Wittgenstein. *John S. Feinberg, Ph. D.*

ITST6007 Contemporary Theology II

This course is an examination of some of the major trends in contemporary theology. Discussion focuses on theologies prevalent since the 1960's: Theology of Hope, Liberation Theology, Feminist Theology, Process Theology, New Age Theology, and four forms of Postmodern Theology. *John S. Feinberg, Ph.D.*

ITPT5004 Christian Worldview

After an introduction to the nature and function of a worldview, a Christian Worldview is developed out of a redemptive history model of theology. It is applied to metaphysics, epistemology and axiology, and contrasted with modern and postmodern thought. Argument is made for developing and living an explicitly Christian Worldview, with specific application to Christian ministry. *James Grier, Th.D.*

ITCH6006 Church History to the Reformation

The course provides an in-depth introduction to the development of the Christian church's doctrine, faith, and practice from its founding at Pentecost to the time of the Protestant Reformation. *Garth M. Rosell, Ph. D.*

ITCH6007 Church History since the Reformation

The course provides an in-depth introduction to the development of the Christian church since the time of the Protestant Reformation to the present day. *Garth M. Rosell, Ph.D.*

ITCH6001 The Ancient Church

A study of the church from the close of the NT in AD 95 to approximately AD 600, the course covers the church and the Roman Empire, ecclesiastical organization, development of theology and dogma, and Christian life and worship. *Richard Gamble, Th.D.*

ITCH6002 Reformation Church History

This course is a study of the development of the theology, the piety, and the churches of the Reformation against the backdrop of the social, political, and intellectual character of the sixteenth century. *Robert Godfrey, Th.D.*

ITCH6003 History of Christianity in America

The course examines the history of the Protestant church in America from colonial beginnings to the present with emphasis on the numerous influences that have forged the current religious scene. *John Hannah, Th.D.; Ph.D.*

ITCE6002 Interpersonal Communication and Conflict Management

This course examines interpersonal communication and conflict management within Christian organizations. Attention is given to communication, self-concept, non-verbal messages, stress, and the productive use of conflict management. *Kenneth Gangel, Ph. D & Samuel Canine*

ITCE6003 Advanced Leadership & Administration

This advanced course develops the Biblical foundation and practical functions of administrative leadership in churches and Christian organizations. Emphasis is on the attitudes and skills of team leaders. *Kenneth Gangel, Ph. D.*

ITCH6004 Adult Ministries in the Church

This course reviews the principles of adult learning and their application to adults and specific groups such as singles, single parents, and families. Practical steps are given to analyze the church's entire adult ministry. *Kenneth Gangel, Ph.D.*

ITCE6005 Effective Administrative Leadership

This course maintains a balance between Biblical instruction and practical information for successful administration. *Kenneth Gangel, Ph.D.*

ITMT6000 Evangelism and the Local Church

This course covers such vital topics as: the Biblical mandate for evangelism, the true Gospel message, presenting the Gospel, follow-up and discipleship, evangelism in the church, and contemporary issues in evangelism. *Michael P. Green, Ph.D.*

ITMT6001 Spiritual Formation

An investigation into the meaning of Biblical Christianity and its relationship to faith and practice within contemporary culture. Special attention is given to the corporate dimensions of spirituality and spiritual formation, in contrast to the historical and cultural factors that have led to the privatization of Christianity. A paradigm of spiritual growth is developed. *John Lillis, Ph.D.*

ITWM6001 Introduction to World Missions

An introductory survey of the theology, history, culture, politics, and methods of Christian mission. Special emphasis is given to recent developments, crucial issues, future trends, and missions in the local church. *William Taylor, Ph.D. & Richard Cotton, Th.M.*

ITWM6002 History of Missions

The course traces the historic development of Christian mission in chronological sequence from Pentecost to William Carey, then the modern period along geographical lines. The course concludes with an evaluation of the achievements of the past and the prospects for the future. *Herbert Kane, L.H.D.*
